

Conference 2017 Feedback Article - Susie Couper

Attendees at the Conference had the fantastic opportunity to hear Paula James MD, FRCPC speak in several sessions. She is Professor at the Hematology - Department of Medicine at Queen's University Ontario, Canada. She is Co-Chair of the von Willebrand Factor Scientific and Standardization Committee (SSC) of the International Society on Thrombosis and Haemostasis (ISTH) and Medical Director of the Women and Bleeding Disorders Clinic among other roles.

On Saturday I attended a session on von Willebrand disorder with Paula James as key speaker. By the end of the session it was clear she is dedicated and passionate about treating and improving quality of life for people with vWD. Her session was informative without being overly technical. She spoke on the challenges of testing and diagnosis as a result of the different types of vWD. The logistics of collection and lab limitations also impacts on diagnosis – this is not unique to Canada and is as relevant here in Australia. The different treatment options were laid out and she explained why some were the treatment of choice based on type and bleeding symptoms. How symptoms can change through life and how, as a result treatment needs may differ was explained. She shared the 'Factor First' card that has been developed in Canada to improve treatment outcomes in emergency situations.

One of the key points that she made was that in their clinic, they treat on symptoms, not type. Sometimes a person may be 'bleeding NYD' – bleeding not yet diagnosed, in the hope that a diagnosis will be possible at some point in the future. She shared a study finding that showed that the quality of life for women with menorrhagia is as bad as a person with haemophilia and HIV. As a result of this, their clinic's treatment is about getting bleeding under control as well as treating iron deficiency, even if anaemia is not yet present.

The following day, Paula James spoke in a session with Dr Chris Barnes (VIC) and Dominic Pepperell (WA). This recapped the first session and then expanded to cover the additional work Paula James is doing. She introduced the 'Lets talk period' website, (<https://letstalkperiod.ca>) which is her campaign to increase awareness of bleeding disorders. This website has the SELF-BAT – a bleeding assessment tool that people can take themselves which can help a person determine if they have an abnormal bleeding score. With these results, people are advised they may benefit from seeing a Haemophilia Treatment Centre (HTC) for testing, diagnosis and care. Paula and her team developed the SELF-BAT to provide a test that people could complete themselves. With issues on access, recognition and doctor knowledge, a self test is a powerful tool to help address the rates of undiagnosed people with bleeding disorders. The website has blog posts as well, which I would encourage you to look at; there's some really interesting reading there about school outreach, period tracking apps, treatment and communication.

After Paula spoke, there was a panel discussion with plenty of questions from the audience. One of the key learnings I got was that diagnosis is challenging for health care professionals, as well as patients. They broached concern over the possible stigma that providing a diagnosis or label may cause. They talked through how diagnosis is not a simple yes / no event and requires technical expertise as well as empathy and understanding.

In the afternoon Sharron Inglis and I joined Kim Shaw (Maurice Blackburn) and Paula James to deliver a session on 'Women and Telling Others'. Kim Shaw spoke on employment and insurance and provided her insights on disclosure requirements and discrimination. This is an area I must admit I knew next to nothing about and I appreciated her efforts to make the content understandable and useable. Her advice was to disclose at the time of application if you are applying for a personal insurance policy like income protection but group policies like that in your super don't require disclosure.

She also explained that insurers can only discriminate on the basis of actuarially statistical risk – do they have the proof in the form of a statistical study to prove the risk of injury / sickness for the condition.

Sharron and I both shared personal stories of telling others about our bleeding disorders. Sharron's piece was the broad strokes, covering her whole of life experience since she was diagnosed at 3. It was interesting to hear someone who finds disclosure not to be a challenge or emotionally difficult. She responds to the stigma or 'I know better' judgements of others frankly and with good humour. She has the benefit of working in a medical industry, so finds most people at work to have a higher degree of knowledge than your average lay person, and that makes workplace disclosure so much easier. My story was how disclosure can be helpful when you least expect it. An office worker doesn't expect to be leaving in an ambulance, but that's what happened to me. I talked through how telling my manager was more than one statement and how it helped her confidently respond to address my medical needs when I couldn't speak for myself.

This conference was informative and the speakers of all the sessions I attended were obviously passionate and committed. The personal stories shared in the sessions by parents and people living with bleeding disorders were all so fascinating. I can't remember the role of the person who I was talking to in one of the breaks but she said this was one of the few conferences like this that bring together both sides of the experience. That other health professionals don't get to hear the lived experience alongside the technical aspect. We are so fortunate to be building a community of care that is working to bring the patient perspective to the forefront. To hear the hierarchy of doctor / patient acknowledged and then hear how one HTC is working to break that down, gives me hope that we are heading in the right direction in Australia.

City to Surf Report - Julene Verser

Questions From Members

What is 'subcut' – I heard sister Lee mention it at the AGM when she was talking about the new treatments being developed?

Subcut is short for subcutaneous. Subcutaneous means under the skin. So, a subcutaneous injection is a method of administering medication under the skin rather than into the vein or a port. In this type of injection, a short needle is used to inject into the tissue layer between the skin and the muscle.

In terms of treatments for bleeding disorders, subcut is not available like your normal factor replacement therapy yet. However there is a trial in Australia 'A Study to Evaluate the Safety and Tolerability of Prophylactic Efficizumab in Hemophilia A Patients With Inhibitors' currently recruiting in WA. Talk to your HTC for more info about this trial or other trials that you may find relevant.

W.A.Y. Western Australia Youth event held in conjunction, giving all families an opportunity to see what an amazing bunch our youth are and see what's next for some of our younger members.





Change To MyABDR REMEMBER ME Function

From the National Blood Authority and HFA MyABDR teams

From **Tuesday 22 August 2017** if you want to use the **REMEMBER ME** function on the MyABDR app, **you will need to set a 4-digit pin.**



To set the PIN, at the login screen tap the **REMEMBER MY DETAILS** button NOT **LOGIN**.

WHY HAS THIS CHANGE OCCURRED?

You may be aware of the current concerns at a national level about the protection of personal information.

Protecting ABDR/MyABDR users' personal information on mobile devices and computers, while preserving favourite functionality has been a subject of considerable discussion between the National Blood Authority and HFA.

Against this background the NBA has implemented a simple solution of a four digit pin lock to access MyABDR on your mobile device.

This solution is only required when accessing and using MyABDR and does not impact on the use of your mobile device. The pin lock is very similar to other applications such as online banking.

The enhancement to the 'Remember my details' functionality means that you can continue to use this option knowing that your access to the ABDR/MyABDR system is now more secure.

HOW WILL THIS WORK?

- When you tap the REMEMBER MY DETAILS button at the LOGIN screen, you will be invited to set a 4-digit PIN.
- Whenever REMEMBER MY DETAILS is activated, you will need to use your 4-digit PIN to login if you have not used MyABDR in the last 30 seconds.
- However, when you are logged out and need to login again, you will still need to enter your email and password – **BUT!!**
- If you want to use the 'remember me' functionality, you should tap on the REMEMBER MY DETAILS button rather than LOGIN to login, and then set or reset your PIN.

OTHER SECURITY IMPROVEMENTS

The National Blood Authority rolled out the new PIN functionality with other security improvements in the MyABDR release on 22 August 2017:

- Security improvements to the website version
- New messages on the mobile app where the device is insecure
- MyABDR will no longer be accessible from 'rooted' or 'jailbroken' devices.
